

Guiding Questions for Educators: Tutorials

Unlike traditional tutorials, which are often one-to-one reteaching with limited student engagement, in an AVID tutorial session, students work together in small groups to make meaning of content and ideas, with their teacher/tutor present—monitoring, guiding when necessary, differentiating, supporting, and scaffolding.

Considerations for Implementing a Tutorial Plan:

- What tutorial process will you expect students to follow?
- How will you provide opportunities for students to learn and practice the tutorial process?
- What skills do you expect students to use and develop before, during, and after tutorials?
- What student roles might you establish and provide accountability for?
- How might small group tutorials be structured so that students learn from each other during a tutoring session?

- How might you intentionally develop a learning environment during tutorials where students feel brave enough to participate?
- How will you support students' positive communication and use of academic language during tutorials?
- What will you look for to ensure that students are engaged during tutorials?
- How can you support refinement and continuous improvement in tutorials?
- How will you identify, train, and equip tutors?
